

From Your Rector

Dear Friends,

Round, like a circle in a spiral, like a wheel within a wheel...

Many years ago, at the Pleasure Beach at Blackpool, there was a certain 'ride' or amusement that was strictly for the physically fit. It consisted of a flat wooden disc about 20 feet in diameter and set at an angle of 45 degrees in the floor. When it began to rotate, the aim was to get to the centre where there was a pole. As the disc rotated faster and faster, everyone who failed to get to the pole got flung off. Nowadays there's probably a regulation banning it as far too dangerous!

The principle of the game was a basic law of physics. When any wheel rotates, the outer rim moves fastest of all. Half way to the centre and you are moving a lot more slowly. And, at least theoretically, at the absolute centre will be a point which is totally still. That's why anyone who reached that pole could stand there quite comfortably.

We have just started the Church's season of Lent. It's generally thought of as being a time for giving up chocolate, wine, whatever. But it's really a time to remind us that in our own rapidly spinning world, God is the still centre.

All around God is motion, sound, change and decay – galaxies circling, seasons and years rotating, life developing and decaying. And at the still centre, where there is no variableness, is God, the same yesterday, today and forever.

At Christmas, we thanked God for entering the ever moving and changing life of the world. But one great characteristic of Jesus was His stillness. Busy, harassed, injured people found someone with neither clever chat nor idle gossip, neither vulgar boasting nor loud opinion. His life always seemed to rotate round a still central point, which gave Him His balance and authority.

"Be still then and know that I am God" wrote the Psalmist. Lent is a time for us to stop and remember that. Lent is a good time to be a little more silent than usual - quicker to listen and slower to speak. And the more silent spaces we give ourselves, the more we'll give that still, small Voice within.

God's stillness is still full of energy. That still centre of the spinning disc is also the point which drives the rest of the rotating circle. Equally, when we're in touch with that still centre, we'll be able to give strength and support to those who feel they're spinning at the edges.

Being still does mean that we need to take time to pause, to take stock, to take a critical look at our lives. That's what Lent is about. On the spinning discs of our own lives, we need to remember that there is a still centre, calm and yet full of energy – which is where God is.

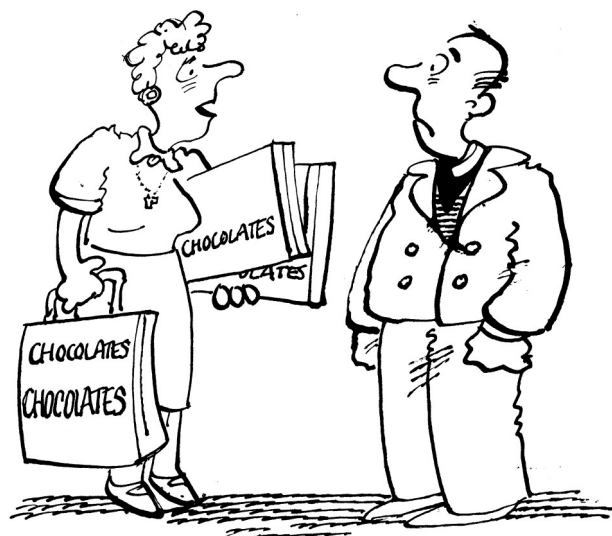

MEETING OF PARISHIONERS AND ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

All parishioners are invited to two meetings on Sunday April 7th at St Chad's at 6.30 pm, to hear reports on the activities and finances of the church during 2018 and to appoint members of the congregations as churchwardens, members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC), members of the Deanery Synod and sidespersons.

The Meeting of Parishioners

The only business during the Meeting of Parishioners is to elect or re-elect churchwardens. They are appointed for a year and are legally officers of the bishop. They work closely with the Rector and the PCC in reporting any issues, particularly in relation to the buildings or church grounds. There is a time limit of six consecutive years on an appointment as churchwarden. We should have two churchwardens, but at present we have only one and it is increasingly important to appoint another. If you are interested in this, please speak to the Rector or Liz Whitehead.

The Rector must receive nominations for churchwardens on the proper forms before the meeting begins. Nominations may not be made after the meeting has begun. Anyone who lives in the parish can vote in the Meeting of Parishioners.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM)

The PCC is responsible for maintaining the churchyard, the buildings and their contents. Deanery Synod members represent the parish at Synod meetings. Sidespersons (sometimes called churchwarden's assistants) help with the arrangements at services. During the meeting, we elect people to all these roles. We shall also receive written reports on what the PCC discussed in 2018, the church accounts and the organisations associated with the church.

You can see the names of the sidespersons in the churches on the duty rotas. PCC members are elected for three years, with

five members retiring each year. (That might change, since the number of elected PCC members depends on the electoral roll and we are renewing our electoral roll from scratch this year, but for the time being, we must assume that will not happen.)

At present, there are expected to be six vacancies for elected members, as Andrew Harford will have reached the end of his term of office, Chris Perry has retired and there are four other vacancies. Four of these are until 2022 and one until 2021. Andrew Harford may be re-elected and Judith Hodgson, who is a co-opted member, may also be elected. We are hoping for new members who can bring fresh ideas and insights to our discussions and decisions.

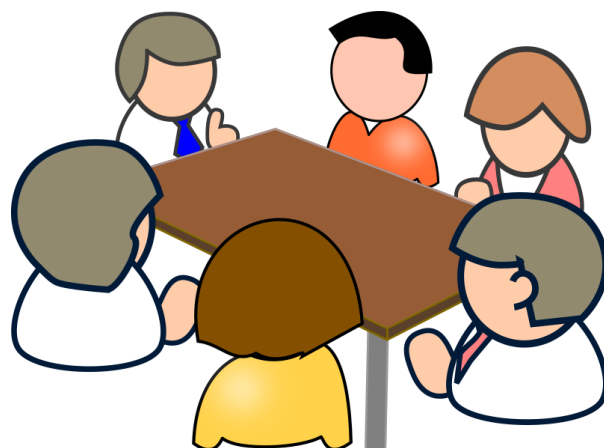
The current three-year term of office of our Deanery Synod representatives ends in 2020. At present, Julie Parmenter, Malcolm Studholme and Chris Smale represent us.

Anyone who has any interest in becoming more involved in helping with church activities should speak as soon as possible to the Rector, the Honorary Secretary or to any PCC member. Everyone can offer something – do not be put off just because you think you don't know enough about it

Notices will be displayed in both churches with more details of the meetings, and with nomination forms for PCC members, deanery synod representatives and churchwardens.

Finally, if there are any matters that you wish to bring forward for discussion, please inform the Rector or the Honorary Secretary before the meeting.

2) ANNUAL MEETING OF PARISHIONERS

a) Approval of Minutes of Previous Meeting (30th April 2017)

The minutes had been published in the March magazine, page 12, and copies were available at the meeting. It was agreed unanimously that they were a true and accurate record.

b) Election of Churchwardens

Mrs E Whitehead had been nominated by Mr R Dennison, seconded by Mr R Jackson. There were no other nominations and Mrs Whitehead was re-elected, the second post of churchwarden being left unfilled.

3) ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

a) Approval of Minutes of Previous Meeting (30th April 2017)

The minutes had been published in the March magazine, page 12, and copies were available at the meeting. It was agreed unanimously that they were a true and accurate record.

b) Approval of the following Reports published in the Annual Report

- iv) 2nd Irby Rainbows
- v) Tots and Tinies

The nine reports listed under c – e above were accepted unanimously.

4) Safeguarding Arrangements

A report by the Parish Safeguarding Officer, Mrs Kathryn Timmins, published in the Annual Report, was accepted unanimously.

5) The Financial Affairs of the Parish during 2017

Mr Marley, the Honorary Treasurer, gave a verbal statement of the financial affairs of the parish, referring to the accounts that had been included in the Annual Report. The Rector thanked Mr Marley for all the work he had undertaken to produce the accounts and to provide helpful guidance throughout the year. The parish was extremely grateful for all he had done.

6) The Independently Examined Accounts for 2017

The independently inspected annual accounts for 2017 were agreed unanimously by the meeting, the motion having been proposed by Mrs K Robson and seconded by Mr C Perry.

7) Appointment of an Independent Examiner of the Accounts for 2018

Mrs J Trigg proposed the appointment of Mrs M Walker, Chartered Accountant, Irby, as the Independent Examiner of the accounts for 2018. The proposal, which was seconded by Mrs B Appleyard, was approved unanimously by the meeting.

8) Matters discussed by the Deanery Synod during 2017

The report was accepted unanimously.

9) Election of a member of the congregations to fill a casual vacancy to represent the parish at the Deanery Synod until 2019 and one member until 2020

Mrs P Crammond, seconded Mr C Smale, proposed Mrs J Parmenter. As there were no other proposals, Mrs Parmenter was declared elected.

10) Election of five members of the Parochial Church Council to serve until 2021 and one member to serve until 2020

The following people were elected or re-elected as members of the PCC:

- i. Mr C Williams, proposed by Mr M Studholme, seconded by Mr C Perry, and elected until 2021
- ii. Mr J Oliver, proposed by Mr R Jackson, seconded by Mr R Dennison, and elected until 2021
- iii. Mr R Dennison, proposed by Mr R Jackson, seconded by Mr C Perry, and elected until 2021
- iv. Mr C Perry, proposed by Mrs J Deboorder, seconded by Mr M Studholme, and elected until 2021
- v. Mr R Jackson, proposed by Mr R Dennison, seconded by Mr C Perry, and elected until 2021
- vi. Mrs P Neil, proposed by Mrs B Appleyard, seconded by Mr J Hodgson, and elected until 2020

Following a proposal that Mrs J Hodgson should be a member of the PCC, it was agreed that she would be co-opted when eligible, as she had not been on the Electoral Roll for six months.

11) Appointment of Sidespersons

All serving sidespeople were re-appointed unanimously. More sidespeople were required at St Chad's, as well as more people for the Bible readings and the prayers of intercession.

12) Other Business

There was none.

13) Rector's closing remarks

The Rector thanked everyone for their support during the year and thanked Mr Smale for keeping a record of the meeting, after which Mrs E Whitehead paid tribute to the Rector for her hard work throughout the year. She also thanked both the Rector and Mr C Perry for the support and guidance which they had offered her during her first year as churchwarden. The meeting closed with the Grace at 7.15 pm.

Psalm 63 – or how to cope with the pressures of daily life

If you had to describe our society in a single word, the most appropriate one would be *pressure*. We live with pressure in every aspect of life, from our school, work or family life, to the big issues facing our world.


King David knew what it meant to live under pressure. His son, Absalom, led a rebellion against him, resulting in David fleeing for his life into the wilderness of Judah. It was there that he wrote Psalm 63. The psalm demonstrates the priorities of a person of God under pressure.

God my desire: 'You, God, are my God, earnestly I seek you; I thirst for you, my whole being longs for you, in a dry and parched land where there is no water.' (v1). David's physical thirst was an expression of his deeper thirst to know God. Even though separated from the worship of the sanctuary, he chose to seek God. When God seems distant or silence in our lives, we too can choose to seek him; this can be a vital path of growth in our relationship with him.

God my delight: 'Because your love is better than life, my lips will glorify you.' (3). David's delight in God is expressed in praise, as he recognises God's love for him. What gives us delight in our lives? Does it come from the things of this world or from God himself?

God my defence: 'I cling to you; your right hand upholds me.' (8). David is surrounded by enemies, but confident in God's defence and purpose

for him. God uses our troubles and disappointments to fulfil his will, as he develops our character and trust in his purposes.

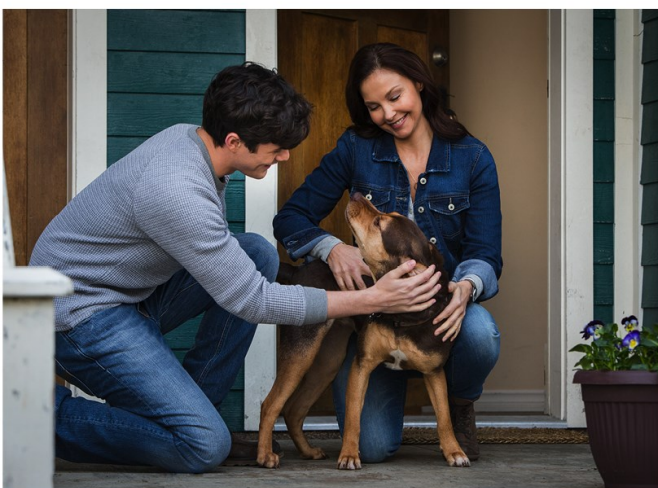

A Dog's Way Home tells the story of Bella, a beautiful dog who becomes separated from her beloved human family and embarks on an epic 400-mile journey home. For those of us who have despaired at films filled with ear-splitting explosions or salacious storylines, *A Dog's Way Home* will be a breath of fresh air (indeed you can almost feel the fresh air as Bella travels through wonderful scenery beautifully filmed). But this is more than a feel-good movie for dog-lovers, as it illustrates important lessons for our own journey through life.



Though Bella is ceaselessly focused on her goal, yet she still stops to provide comfort and support to those she meets along the way. And, although her love for others is unconditional, the help she provides subsequently leads to assistance for herself in her own time of need. Sometimes this is reciprocated directly, as with the orphaned baby cougar whom she adopts and feeds. At other times the benefit is tangential, as with the man she digs out of an avalanche. BBC to run a 'Year of Beliefs'

The BBC is going to 'shine a light' on faith and spiritual values in Britain today by running a year of programmes dedicated to religion and ethics.

The move comes a year after the BBC promised to 'raise our game' in the way that it treated religion. That promise followed a year-long review of its religious and ethics output.

So what series should we look out for? Here are just some:

On BBC 1, *Earth's Sacred Wonders* will look at the rituals and monuments of faith around the world; *Medical Ethics* will be a documentary filmed at Great Ormond Street Hospital; and *Pregnant and Platonic* will be a documentary on people who have children without being in a romantic relationship.

On BBC 2, *Inside the Vatican* will show a year in the life of the Vatican community, including Pope Francis; and the popular *Pilgrimage* series will return.

The Bishop of Repton, the Rt. Revd. Jan McFarlane, who chairs the Sandford St Martin Trust, welcomed the BBC's plans. Especially "bringing issues of faith, belief and ethics to as wide an audience as possible."

Women's ordination – 25 years on

Twenty-five years ago this month, women were ordained as priests in the Church of England. As the BBC commentator on the first service in Bristol Cathedral I was prepared for disruptions from demonstrators, but it proceeded reverently and without a hitch. The only protest was outside, where a group of approving Roman Catholic women held a banner saying, 'We're Next'.

Of course, there are still people who object to women's ordination on principle. Some believe the practice frustrates the prospect of church unity, others hold that God has created women and men to hold complementary but different roles - and leadership in the Church is reserved for men.

At the last count, 30% of the 20,000 active clergy were women and 23% of the senior posts were held by women, and that includes 18 bishops.

It would be difficult now to imagine the Church of England without women priests and bishops. They serve as chaplains in prison, hospital and the Armed Services, and of course as Vicars and Curates in parish churches.

Hannah Madin was ordained 18 months ago when she was 28, and is a Curate in York. She recalls visiting a parishioner whose husband had just died; the widow said, "I wasn't expecting a female Vicar, but I'm so glad you are". Hannah's husband is also ordained; she says it helps that he understands the random and unique nature of the job, they support each other in prayer, and they never talk shop on their day off!

Sue Restall was one of those ordained in Bristol 25 years ago and is now in active retirement in the Midlands, having been a parish priest and a hospital chaplain. In her experience, although women and men may have different talents, that is more to do with personality than gender. However, she does recall making a bereavement visit when a widower cried his eyes out, saying he could only have done that in front of a woman. Sue says her role is no longer controversial – "I am simply a priest who happens to be a woman".

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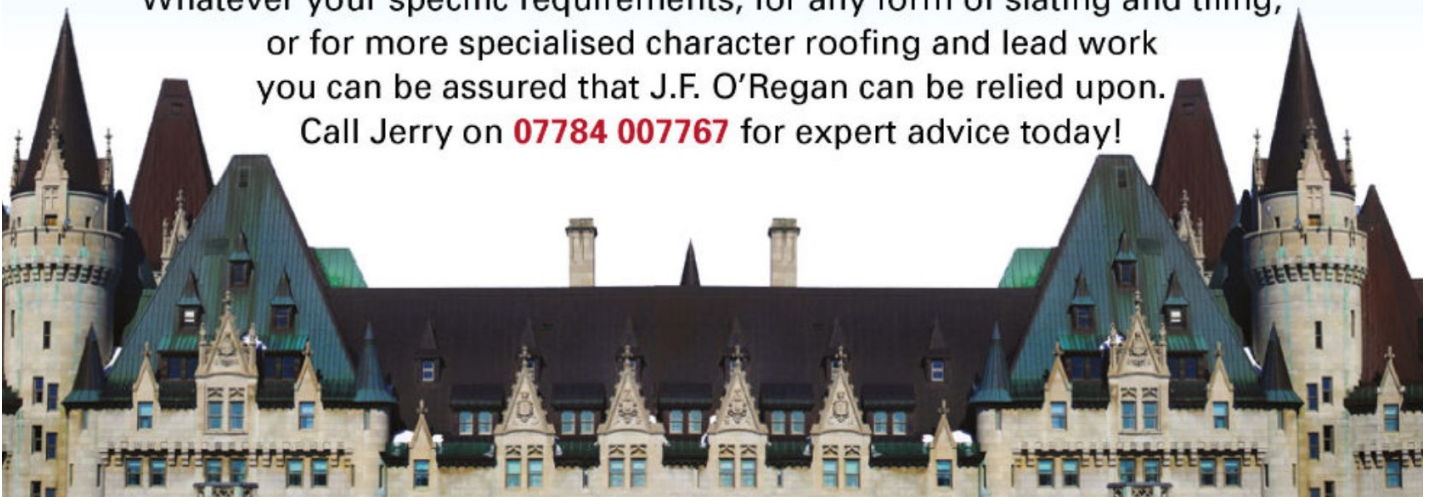
